Alvar Aalto Nicholas Ray Alvar Aalto Nicholas Ray An Unexpected Dialogue of Form and Feeling Alvar Aalto the Finnish master of organic modernism and Nicholas Ray the rebellious American director of film noir and rebelwithoutacause narratives might seem like unlikely bedfellows Yet a compelling comparison emerges when examining their shared artistic philosophies focusing on a fundamental tension between structure and emotion form and feeling While separated by medium architecture and cinema Aalto and Ray explored similar themes of human experience utilizing their chosen forms to express a profound empathy for the individual within a larger often unforgiving context Aaltos Architecture Embracing the Human Scale Aaltos architecture transcends the rigid geometries of early modernism He championed humancentered design rejecting the cold functionalist aesthetic in favor of warmth and intuitive functionality His buildings from the Paimio Sanatorium to the Syntsalu Town Hall are characterized by organic forms natural materials wood brick stone and a meticulous attention to detail Imagine a flowing river Aaltos architecture similarly adapts to its surroundings meandering and responding to the landscape and its inhabitants His use of light both natural and artificial is masterful creating atmospheres of calm and contemplation or dynamic energy depending on the intended function This humancentric approach is evident in his furniture designs as well His iconic bent plywood chairs for example are ergonomically designed for comfort and intuitive use reflecting his deep understanding of human needs This focus on the human body extends to the very fabric of his buildings with spaces intuitively scaled for human interaction and movement Rays Cinema Exploring the Fractured Psyche Nicholas Rays cinematic universe is marked by a similar concern for the human condition albeit expressed through a different lens His films often characterized by stark lighting unsettling compositions and morally ambiguous characters explore the anxieties and alienation of postwar America Think of the fractured mirror image Rays films often reflect the fragmented psyches of his protagonists individuals struggling to find their place in a rapidly changing world 2 Films like Rebel Without a Cause Johnny Guitar and In a Lonely Place showcase Rays ability to visually convey internal

this innovative edited collection charts the rise fall and possible futures of the word primitive the word primitive is fundamental to the discipline of architecture in the west providing a convenient starting point for the many myths of architecture s origins since the almost legendary 1970s conference on the primitive with the advent of post modernism and in particular post colonialism the word has fallen from favour in many disciplines despite this architects continue to use the word to mythologize and reify the practice of simplicity primitive includes contributions from some of today s leading architectural commentators including dalibor vesely adrian forty david leatherbarrow richard weston and richard coyne structured around five sections negotiating origins urban myths questioning colonial constructs making marks and primitive futures the essays highlight the problematic nature of ideas of the primitive engage with contemporary debate in the field of post colonialism and respond to a burgeoning interest in the non expert architecture this now controversial subject remains for better or worse intrinsic to the very structure of modernism and deeply embedded in architectural theory considering a broad range of approaches this book provides a rounded past present and future of the word primitive in the architectural sphere

this book addresses the built environment through the lens of environmental architecture and in a holistic manner it moves gradually from psychophysiology and thinking doing feeling modalities through environmental criteria to environmental modulation concluding with a debate around mitigation and adaptation much use is made of re interpreting past quotations seen as relevant for environmental architecture no definitive conclusions are reached but rather broad discursive messages are offered the text will have lasting luminance for new generations involved with the built environment
