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leading higher education as and for public good asserts that the purpose of higher education is twofold for public good and as public good acknowledging that the notion of public good increasingly cannot be taken for granted the book argues that leading teaching and learning must be directly connected to its pursuit it avers and demonstrates how this may be accomplished articulating specific approaches and dispositions that require cultivation within university communities this volume argues that leading higher education occurs within competing and sometimes conflicting webs of commitments necessitating a capacity to negotiate legitimate compromises its empirical chapters expand on this providing examples of academic developers who use deliberate communication as a method in cultivating leading and teaching praxis what emerges is the potential of deliberative leadership to be transformative in building sustainable leadership in higher education while simultaneously renewing commitments to education and contributing to public good leading higher education as and for public good is essential reading for policy makers university leaders and administrators academics students and all those interested in building a sustainable future for higher education that also contributes to public good

as indicated by the diversity of the authors physical locations covid and emergency remote teaching affected higher education institutions at a nearly global scale authors in this issue come from european countries switzerland germany north america the usa as well as the southern hemisphere south africa given the breadth of covid related change experiences the insights presented in this issue can be relevant to many heis across the globe notwithstanding their cultural and institutional specificities in addition and of high relevance to us the articles collected here focus both on different positions or roles students faculty management as well as on different levels of teaching and learning in higher education while most contributions focus on the student experience during covid others investigate faculty instructors perspectives including faculty development yet another group takes a more systemic institutional point of view it could be argued that higher education research takes up a multi level perspective when exploring change and the new normal

the anthology discusses the importance of internationalization of higher

higher education is in trouble commentators of all stripes bemoan escalating costs and diminishing quality solutions have been offered from all quarters but tend to be piecemeal and all too often ideological in this tough minded look at the history current climate and future of university education in the united states melvyn I fein reexamines the mission of higher education and outlines what institutions can do to better prepare students for an ever more complex techno commercial society fein argues that students must have the opportunity to explore and discover what works for them and that the most important tool for institutions of higher education is self direction professors must be allowed to teach in their own ways bringing their own experience into the classroom since university missions differ both universities and professors need the freedom to make decisions independently the imminent need is for a democratic elite consisting of self directed leaders who possess technical and social expertise as well as personal motivation the tools for change are appropriate curricula communities of learners and a genuine marketplace of ideas while there is no magic bullet fein contends that we can and should build on the achievements of the past so as to evolve more responsive educational institutions those that promote merit responsibility and universalism

sandra featherman believes that colleges are in denial about the severity of the threats to the current model of higher education based on her own experience as a president as a trustee and as a board member who has worked in private and public universities and on interviews with the presidents of major institutions she offers both a trenchant analysis of those threats and clear prescriptions about the painful but necessary decisions that colleges need to make to ensure they remain viable accessible and affordable and deliver a high quality education sandra featherman considers higher education to be at a

game changing moment when markets don't function well as is the case with today's college marketplace with offerings that cost too much and return too little it opens the door to new types of suppliers who offer new ways of providing what students are looking for particularly the increasing cohort of mature working students in the face of new competitors for profit education companies technology start ups and foreign universities vying for international students trustees and senior level administrators are generally stuck in a traditional ethos and with decision making processes unsuited to these times they know what used to work and find it easier to follow old ways than to make the difficult transition to new ways of delivering education she lays out a strategy that emphasizes the centrality of students and how to provide them with the most effective learning environment that is clear eyed about focusing on the core missions and abandoning practices that constrain or impede them and that requires constant self monitoring to learn from and act upon what works she offers a blueprint for redesigning institutions for paring away what is unnecessary and cost ineffective and for adopting the best technologies all in the service of developing meaningful degree programs at an affordable price and widening access for under represented groups she ranges over the implications of budget decisions accreditation and moocs addresses government regulation and tuition costs presents promising new models and concludes with 11 key recommendations that should be heeded by all higher education administrators and trustees

during the 1980s the whole higher education scene in britain shifted dramatically originally published in 1980 and here reissuing the second edition of 1992 process and structure in higher education presents a synoptic model of how the system as a whole now functions and how its various components are interconnected drawing on detailed interview data from leading figures in british higher education on their own inside knowledge and research and on an extensive review of the relevant research literature the authors explore the characteristic values and practices of the four main levels in the system the central authorities the institution the basic unit and individual and analyse the pattern of relationships between them they note the changes that have taken place in the last decade and look ahead to how the system seems likely to develop in the future although the analysis is based on the uk much of it is relevant to higher education in other countries in its unravelling of complex issues such as academic freedom the tensions between research and teaching the influence of market forces on institutions of higher education and the apparent resistance of leading universities to change process and structure in higher education does much to demystify the nature of higher education it will
