Seit 1928 wurde es auf der Basis des *Kiunguja* standardisiert und 1961 wurde es zur Amtssprache Tansanias erklärt. Es ist Nationalsprache von Tansania, Kenia und Uganda. Eine der vier Nationalsprachen des Kongo. Ehemals Zaire, besonders in der Shaba-Provinz. In Form des *Kingwana* wird auf den Komoren gesprochen. In Form des *Kingazija* wird verstanden in Somalia, Rwanda, Burundi, Namibia, Malawi und Mosambik. Durch Migranten wurde es selbst bis Oman und ins südliche Afrika verbreitet. Klassensprache bzw. Klassensystem bedeutet, dass die Nomina Hauptwörter nicht nach Geschlecht (männlich, weiblich, sächlich) sondern nach asexuellen Kriterien wie menschlich, tierisch, pflanzlich, groß, klein, Instrumente, Kollektive usw. den Klassen eingeteilt werden. In den Bantu-Sprachen erfolgt diese Einteilung durch Präfixe/Vorsilben, die damit in etwa unseren Artikeln entsprechen. Eine Unterscheidung wie bei unserem bestimmten und unbestimmten Artikel existiert jedoch nicht. Das Swahili kennt noch 15 Nominalklassen.
